The Virginia Dominion Envirothon is a natural resources competition that tests teams on soils, forestry, aquatics, wildlife and a special topic chosen each year that allows the students to work to solve real world environmental problems. This year's Virginia Dominion Local Envirothon Competition event sponsored by the Eastern Shore Soil and Water Conservation District and partly funded by Dominion Power Company occurred in two days — an intense day of training and a testing day at the Agricultural Research Extension Center, Painter, VA. The local high schools that participated in the training were Arcadia (Coach Marianne Simko), Broadwater Academy (Coach Sandra Thornton), Chincoteague (Coach Fred Gers), and Northampton (two teams—Coach Kelsey Gaskins and Coach Andrea McCreedy). **Arcadia High School** placed first and Broadwater Academy placed second at this year's Local Dominion Envirothon Competition. Arcadia placed fourth and Broadwater placed fifth at Area VI Envirothon which the Eastern Shore Soil and Water Conservation District hosted. The Area VI Envirothon testing was held at Kiptopeke State Park on April 26, 2017. Dinwiddie High School won first place and went on to compete at the State Competition at Virginia State University, Petersburg, VA May 21-22, 2016 and placed 4th overall.

Spring Grants Awarded

The Eastern Shore Soil and Water Conservation District Endowment Committee **awarded \$1,800 in Spring Grants** this year. These grants are funding small but far-reaching and long-term educational projects.

This year the grants are funding an Educational Landscape Film Series for Master Gardeners, a Caterpillar to Butterfly Program at Broadwater Academy, a field trip for Kiptopeke Elementary students, a Butterfly Garden for the Eastern Shore Ecology Club, a Littles Garden for ages 3-5 for New Roots Youth Garden, a Monarch Butterflies Educational Program for summer migrant students at the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and an expansion of the Eastern Shore Native Plant and Pollinator Garden created by No Limits and a field trip to Kiptopeke State Park for Kiptopeke Elementary. These projects help educators extend knowledge of environmental conservation in a way that brings science to life for the children that impacts them for a lifetime. Applications will be available January of 2018 and awarded by March 2018. Spring Watershed Festival

On Tuesday, April 18, 2017, 140 6th graders from Broadwater Academy, Kiptopeke Elementary, and Occohannock Elementary visited Kiptopeke State Park, attending the Watershed Festival for Northampton County. The Festival was held for Accomack County in the fall. The theme was how the Chesapeake Bay in the 1600s differs from the Chesapeake Bay of today. The students rotated through seven different stations where they went on a hike, saw seining, participated in hands-on activities learning about oysters, bird banding, barrier islands, water movement and our groundwater. The stations were led by AN-PDC, Chincoteague Bay Field Station, Eastern Shore National Wildlife Refuge, Northampton County 4-H, The Nature Conservancy, VA Dept of Game & Inland Fisheries and Kiptopeke State Park.



Local Eastern Shore Producer Earns Edward H. Ralph DPI Medal of Achievement

At the Delmarva Poultry Industry's Booster Banquet in Salisbury, MD, on April 18, 2017, the Edward H. Ralph DPI Medal of Achievement was presented to Dave Lovell of Melfa, Virginia. The award goes to a non-elected person for outstanding service on behalf of Delmarva's chicken industry.

Mr. Lovell, who served on DPI's board of directors, has been raising chickens since 1991, and he owns eight chicken houses on his farm, Old Mill Farms in Melfa, VA. He has been an innovator in putting environmentally friendly features into practice on his farm and has been deeply involved in sustainability issues that affect the entire industry. He is an active Director of the Eastern Shore Soil and Water Conservation District and has worked with the Chesapeake Bay Foundation to promote understanding of the chicken industry.

Mr. Lovell also participates in the Delmarva Land & Litter Challenge, a private-sector group working to find new ways to use chicken litter while preserving the chicken industry and improving water quality in the Chesapeake Bay.
