## 2019 Dominion Energy Envirothon

The Virginia Dominion Energy Envirothon is a natural resources competition that tests teams on soils, forestry, aquatics, wildlife and a special topic chosen each year that allows the students to work to solve real world environmental problems. This year's Virginia Dominion Energy Local Envirothon Competition was sponsored by the Eastern Shore Soil and Water Conservation District (Eastern Shore SWCD) and was partly funded by Dominion Energy. The competition occurred in two days – an intense day of training followed a month later by another intense day of testing. Both training and testing days were held at the Anheuser-Busch Coastal Research Station in Oyster, VA. Participating local high schools who competed included Broadwater Academy (two teams— Coach Sandra Thornton), Chincoteague High School (Coach Fred Gers), Nandua High School (Coach Julie Head) and Northampton High School (two teams—Coach Kelsey Gaskins).

Broadwater Academy's Team Gold placed first overall and Chincoteague High School placed second overall at this year's local competition. First and second overall winners would normally go on to compete in the Area Competition but due to scheduling conflicts, Chincoteague High School was unable to compete. Broadwater Academy's Team Green who placed third overall was able to compete along with Broadwater Academy's first place team. The Dominion Energy Area VI Envirothon competition was held on April 24th at Windsor Castle Park in Smithfield and was hosted by the Peanut SWCD.



Are you curious about nature, your environment or just want to have some fun? Well, the Nature Detective Camp is for you. The camp is for ages 8-13 and is held 9:00am-4:00pm in conjunction with Advanced American Spies Camp at Ker Place, Onancock, VA.

Advanced American Spies & Nature Detectives Camp (**July 29 – August 2, 2019 from 9am – 4pm for ages 8-13**) is a joint presentation of the Eastern Shore Soil and Water Conservation District and the Historical Society. It challenges 21st century campers to use their powers of observation, deception and imagination in Spy training. Nature Detectives will hone their observation skills and look closer at the world around them to discover nature's mysteries. During this camp travel behind enemy lines, learn to decode messages and create invisible ink using the same techniques as spies in the Civil War. As a nature detective explore the ecology of the Eastern Shore through kayaking on Onancock Creek, nature journaling and investigation. The week culminates in the completion of a mission and some intriguing arts and crafts.

Campers need to bring their lunch every day. Tuition is \$165 (\$150 for members). All materials, a snack, and a t-shirt are included. ## Billie Fitzgerald Memorial Spring Grants Awarded

In April, the Eastern Shore SWCD's Endowment Committee awarded \$1,136.01 in Spring Conservation Grants. These grants are small, but fund local educational projects.

This year the grants are funding a Monarch Waystation for Accomack County Parks and Recreation, a community pollinator garden for No Limits Eastern Shore, a playground earth project for Cape Charles Christian School and a weather station for New Roots Youth Garden. Educators use these projects to teach environmental conservation in a way that brings science to life for children and the community.

## District Awards Local Conservation Poster Contest Winners

The annual Conservation Poster Contest provides K-12th grade students an opportunity to convey their thoughts about soil, water and related natural resource issues through art. The theme each year follows the annual National Association Conservation Districts (NACD) Stewardship theme with this year's theme being "Life in the Soil: Dig Deeper". The conservation poster contest starts at the local soil and water conservation district level with first place winners in each grade category then submitted to the VA Association of Conservation Districts (VASWCD) to be considered for placement at the VA State level. Finally, State winners advance to the National Contest. This year, seven schools participated in the local competition resulting in 127 entries. Participating schools included Kitptopeke Elementary School, Northampton High School, Cape Charles Christian School, Montessouri Children's House of Franktown, Shore Christian Academy, Broadwater Academy, and Nandua Middle. On April 27th, Eastern Shore SWCD awarded a total of \$500 in cash prizes to 1st - 4th place entries in five grade categories during the Science Fair held at Eastern Shore Community College in Melfa, VA where winning posters were also on display.
